Michael Fix, JD, Senior Fellow, Migration Policy Institute

Michael Fix is a Senior Fellow at the Migration Policy Institute and previously served as its President. With more than 40 years of research and policy experience, Mr. Fix's current research focus is the effect of welfare-related policies on immigrants, immigrant integration and citizenship trends, the education of immigrant children in the U.S. and Europe, and the impact of immigrants on the U.S. labor force. Prior to joining MPI, Mr. Fix was Director of Immigration Studies at the Urban Institute in Washington, DC, where his focus was on immigration and integration policy, race and the measurement of discrimination, and federalism. Mr. Fix was a member of the National Academies Panel on the Integration of Immigrants into American Society, which produced a seminal study on the integration of immigrants in the United States.

Roberto Suro, PhD, Professor, University of Southern California

Roberto Suro holds a joint appointment as a professor in journalism and public policy at the University of Southern California. In 2019 he was awarded a Berlin Prize by the American Academy in Berlin for his work on immigration policy. He received a 2018 USC Mentoring Award for work with undergraduates.

Prior to joining the USC faculty in August 2007, he was director of the Pew Hispanic Center, a research organization in Washington D.C. that he founded in 2001, and in 2004 he was a co-founder of the Pew Research Center.

Suro spent nearly 30 years as a journalist, starting his career at the City News Bureau of Chicago, and including tours at the Chicago Sun Times and TIME Magazine, where he worked as a correspondent in the Chicago, Washington, Beirut and Rome bureaus. In 1985 he started

at The New York Times with postings as bureau chief in Rome and Houston. After a year as an Alicia Patterson Fellow, Suro joined The Washington Post where he served as a staff writer on the national and as deputy national editor.

Monica Mean, PhD, Senior Evaluation Analyst, U.S. Department of Labor

Monica Mean, PhD, is a Senior Evaluation Specialist at the U.S. Department of Labor's Chief Evaluation Office (CEO). Her portfolio includes employment and training programs through the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), apprenticeships, career navigation, reentry programs, and workforce development programs in community colleges. She has expertise in quantitative, qualitative, and mixed methods research in workforce development and policies that affect the intersection between education and employment. Prior to joining CEO, Dr. Mean was an education research analyst in the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Career, Technical, and Adult Education (OCTAE) where she helped shape the research and evaluation priorities for career and technical education and adult education. Dr. Mean received her PhD in public policy from the University of Maryland, Baltimore County where she completed research on the association between taking career and technical education courses in high school and various education and employment outcomes.
