- 95% of prison inmates will return to their communities
  - Access to education can improve post-prison outcomes
  - Budget cuts have threatened capacity for education
- Parental incarceration affects children
  - Homelessness, depression, and aggressive behavior
  - More likely to go to prison themselves
- Incarcerated individuals have low education, literacy, and numeracy

- Profile of incarcerated individuals, focusing on:
  - Parents of dependent children (any under 18 years of age)
  - Parents of grown children (all 18+ years of age)
  - Non-parents
- Outcomes
  - Pre-incarceration education
  - Enrollment and interest in education in prison

Green: higher than for parents of dependent children, statistically significant at 5% level Red: lower than for parents of dependent children, statistically significant at 5% level



- Do individuals with higher literacy/numeracy have bettereducated parents?
- Parents' education is correlated with individuals' skill level
  - Individuals with higher literacy/numeracy less likely to have parents without a high school diploma
  - Literacy more correlated with mothers' education levels than fathers'

- Incarcerated individuals need skill-building opportunities
- Very interested in job opportunities after prison
- Why are some incarcerated individuals uninterested in education?
  - Close to 25% not interested in academic courses
  - PIAAC questionnaire did not capture reasons for this
  - Targeting to appropriate education levels will reduce but not solve this problem
